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About Better Together Housing

Better Together Housing (BTH) is a women-led program that provides a solution for older women who are at risk of becoming homeless. It offers safe, affordable shared housing and puts people first—making sure each woman feels respected and supported.

BTH is more than just a shared housing solution. It helps women feel like they belong, build friendships, and grow their confidence. It also gives them the skills they need to find and keep stable housing, whether that's through shared living or other options.

Instead of relying on resource-heavy, complex responses BTH acts quickly by connecting people and offering ongoing support. This helps tackle both housing problems and loneliness right away.

BTH has already shown it works—and it can be expanded to help even more women. It's a powerful way to prevent homelessness and create stronger, more caring communities.

In 2025-26 we are

- **Scaling impact:** Hosting our largest and most frequent gatherings yet, creating more connections for women over 55 who are being impacted by housing insecurity across the Sunshine Coast.
- **Real outcomes:** Achieving a strong momentum and large increase in housing outcomes for our members including – more successful shared living partnerships, increased referrals to community housing, positive social housing placements, and a growing number of homeowners joining the program to offer their properties for shared living.
- **Women-led governance:** Established a new steering group to strengthen leadership and direction.
- **Building readiness:** Developing practical tools and resources that empower women to become housing ready.
- **Research & innovation:** Working with QUT researcher Lyndall Bryant on the “13 million spare rooms” concept, turning underused housing into immediate solutions.
- **Policy influence:** Collaborating with partners, stakeholders, and local organisations to advocate for shared living as a real, scalable response to the housing shortage.
- **Community first:** Providing ongoing, person-centred support that lessens the impact of housing insecurity and reduces isolation.
- **Community Development:** working in collaboration with partners such as Footprints, Kyabra, Rent Connect and local Community Centres to provide resources and tools to strengthen outcomes for women over 55 being affected by housing insecurity.

Barb – From Fear to Freedom

“I am not afraid anymore – it has totally turned my life around, beyond words.” Says Barb

Feeling Powerless

Barb has lived on the Sunshine Coast all her life. She married young and raised three children, but life was far from easy. Her marriage was marked by violence, and in later years she faced heartbreak, including the tragic loss of her daughter and a series of serious strokes that left her vulnerable.

After leaving hospital, Barb found herself in unsafe temporary housing. She had no control over who she lived with and sadly became a victim of elder abuse. “You see this on the TV,” she says, “but to actually be in that position was so scary. I felt fearful and powerless.”

That was when Sharon from HOWSS (Footprints) connected her with Maggie from Better Together Housing. At first Barb doubted it could help, “I didn’t see the point,” she admits. “Every day was a battle, so I didn’t see how going along to have a coffee at a café was going to make any difference.”

But with encouragement she attended a gathering in Maroochydore which was an important moment for her.

A Turning Point

Walking into that meeting, Barb was nervous and shy. But what she found was extraordinary: a group of women who truly listened, understood, and cared.

“It was amazing,” she recalls. “I felt heard for the first time. It was a relief to be honest and let go of some of the shame.”

One woman suggested trying an over-55s village again and with Sharon’s persistence, Barb soon moved into a one-bedroom unit in Caloundra, close to her granddaughter.

“One day after settling into my little unit I looked in the mirror and thought, ‘Oh my – my eyes are shining again!’ I am the happiest I’ve been in a long, long time.” Says Barb.

The Impact

- Barb’s housing is now safe, stable and affordable
- She has moved from fear to confidence
- Connection and compassion replaced isolation and shame
- Barb feels a renewed sense of hope and purpose

Looking Ahead

Barb now wants others to know what she learned: “There is help out there. Better Housing Together will listen and care.” She says.



Nada – Finding Home and Connection

“I am very grateful to BTH for all the assistance given to me and Nola. If we didn’t have that connection with BTH I would never find Nola... Nola didn’t just give me the house to share, she gave me a HOME!!” Says Nada.



A Life of Resilience

Born in Croatia, Nada married young at 19 and soon after had her first child. But her marriage ended after seven years due to domestic violence. For her safety and her son’s, she was forced to leave, first her husband, and then her country.

She built a new life, raising her son and working for 25 years in aged care. After difficult relationships and financial challenges, she found herself starting over once again alone and struggling to find stable housing that suited her needs.

Searching for the Right Place

Shared housing options Nada tried were either noisy, unsafe, or physically unsuitable. Feeling isolated and unhappy, she turned to Better Together Housing. Confident with technology, she registered online, introduced herself on the members’ forum, and quickly connected with Nola, another woman seeking a housemate.

From their first meeting, it felt right. They shared similar values: privacy, gardening, reading, and simple social outings and agreed to a six-month trial. Nada moved into Nola’s home, and their arrangement soon grew into trust, friendship, and mutual support.

The Impact

- Nada has found a safe, secure, and affordable home
- Friendship and trust with Nola have replaced loneliness and uncertainty
- She has gained a support network, including Nola’s circle of friends
- Most importantly, she is happier and more settled than ever before

Looking Ahead

Nada hopes to stay in her new home with Nola for as long as possible, building on the companionship and mutual support they’ve found. And if circumstances change, they feel confident they can search for a new home together.

Nola – Finding Security and Connection Through Shared Housing

“I thought I was independent. I didn’t realise I was lonely until I shared with Nada. We have made each other’s lives better.” Says Nola.

Nola has lived a full and independent life from working at the ABC in Brisbane and the BBC in London, to managing international conferences on the Gold Coast. She retired to the Sunshine Coast, but by her 80s she faced an impossible choice: her rent had risen, her superannuation was gone, and family could no longer help.

After 50 years of living alone, Nola began looking for options. She discovered Better Housing Together. With support to navigate the application process, Nola was introduced to Nada, who became her housemate.

After a trial period, they signed the lease together in June 2025 as tenants in common. This not only lifted the financial burden from Nola’s family but also gave Nada the chance to build her own tenant history.

A New Chapter of Life

What started as a financial arrangement quickly became something more. Nola says she hadn’t realised how quiet and lonely her days had become until she suddenly had someone to share them with.

Now, the house is filled with the smell of home-cooked meals, laughter over morning coffee, and conversations that brighten the day. Together they’ve created a thriving garden with citrus trees, lavender, and herbs that bring colour and life. Nola still proudly calls herself the “Bougainvillea Queen.”

Nada helps with technology, Nola shares her wisdom, and they both provide the kind of everyday companionship that turns a house into a home.

The Impact

- Nola’s housing is now secure and more affordable
- Family financial pressure has been lifted
- Companionship has replaced isolation
- Both women benefit from shared support and a stronger sense of belonging
- They both feel ongoing security because even if they need to move they have each other

Looking Ahead

Nola and Nada hope to stay in their current home as long as possible. And if circumstances change, they now know they can face the challenge together.

Better Housing Together didn’t just keep a roof over Nola’s head, it gave her a new chapter of life filled with security, support, and friendship.



Karenne – From Uncertainty to Giving Back



“Better Together Housing is a safe place for women. You don’t have to do it on your own. It can feel so hard to ask for help, but if you open up just a little, you’ll find peace and happiness again. If I can do it, anyone can.” Says Karenne.

A Series of Challenges

At 66, Karenne had lived through decades of challenges, dedicating her life to raising her two children. But after losing stable housing in Yandina, she faced a period of deep uncertainty, moving six times in just two years and even having to give up her beloved cat Misty for a time.

Getting Connected

Through Relationships Australia and Pomona Community House, Karenne was introduced to Better Together Housing.

At first, she couldn’t imagine ever sharing a house, but the warmth and understanding she found at her first gathering shifted everything. “I went in not in a good place, but I left realising I wasn’t alone.”

With support from BTH, Karenne is now in safe, secure housing. She has regained confidence and purpose, and she is paying it forward by volunteering at Pomona Community House to support others in her community.

The Impact

- Safe and stable housing has lifted the stress of constant moves
- Confidence and wellbeing have grown with support from BTH
- She has been inspired to give back through volunteering
- Most importantly, she has found hope, connection, and peace

Looking Ahead

Karenne is embracing new opportunities, including volunteer and training courses through Pomona Community House, and is committed to spreading light and support to others.

Gail - Finding Hope and Connection

“There is a space called Better Together Housing that actually exists! You are not alone. Meeting these women, sharing experiences, and knowing there is hope for a better future, it’s life-changing.” Says Gail.

Rediscovering Life After Loss

Gail moved from Brisbane to the Sunshine Coast in 2001. After a diverse career, dedicated to creativity, community, and service, running a hospitality business and managing a live theatre, Gail went on to volunteering with youth, and advocating for the environment.

Gail faced profound grief when her beloved mother passed away at 100 - they had been living together for the past 12 years. She was confronted with uncertainty, pressure to sell the family home, and the reality of facing the future alone. Isolation and worry became overwhelming.

Finding a Community That Cares

In November 2024, Gail joined Better Together Housing. From the first meeting, she felt welcomed and understood. The compassion, warmth, and shared experiences of the women gave her a renewed sense of belonging.

“At Better Together, I met AMAZING, incredible women who had lived rich, valuable, important lives! I felt like I’d met my tribe. The information and support I received gave me confidence that a brighter future than I imagined was possible.”

She found friendship, encouragement, and practical guidance. The women shared their experiences, offered solutions, and listened with genuine care. This support helped Gail regain confidence, see new possibilities, and start planning a secure, independent future.



The Impact

- Friendship replaced isolation, giving Gail emotional strength and companionship
- Hope and optimism returned, as she saw safe, affordable housing as achievable
- Practical support and guidance gave her confidence to navigate options for shared living
- She now feels valued, supported, and part of a community, easing both emotional and practical pressures

Looking Ahead

Gail now sees a future full of opportunity and independence. Inspired by the success stories of other women in Better Together, she feels excited to explore housemate partnerships, build meaningful friendships, and secure safe, affordable accommodation.

Liz – From Uncertainty to Community

“Our challenges can be reduced if shared, even just with a compassionate listener. You are not alone despite your struggles. You can only gain by joining Better Together Housing.” Says Liz.

A New Chapter

At 77, Liz is a retired widow who spent 43 loving years with her husband in Warwick, living close to nature, growing food and caring for animals. After her husband passed away, she moved to the Sunshine Coast to begin a new chapter.

For now, Liz shares her sister’s home, with her belongings in storage while she searches for an affordable rental. Like many women her age, she faced the uncertainty of housing insecurity but knew she wasn’t alone in her situation.

Finding Better Together

About six months ago, a friend told Liz about Better Together Housing. She quickly realised her situation was not unusual, many women her age face the same struggles. By joining, she hoped to meet others in similar circumstances and perhaps find someone to share a home with in the future.

Liz remembers her very first coffee chat with Better Together Housing. She was delighted to meet two sisters who have since become close friends, one of whom may even become her future housemate Lokita. That first meeting reminded her of the power of connection, and of how challenges feel lighter when shared.



The Impact

- Liz has found friendship and connection, easing isolation
- She feels reassured that women’s welfare is being taken seriously
- A supportive community gives her confidence and hope for the future
- She has gained companionship and the possibility of shared housing settled than ever before

Looking Ahead

Liz dreams of taking her belongings out of storage and settling into an affordable home where she can live creatively, give back to her community, and enjoy independence again.

Lokita – Finding Friendship and a Future Together

“BTH will surprise you...with lovely morning teas and lovely women to talk to, to get to know and perhaps to team up with - all under the gentle, capable direction and support of the delightful Maggie.” Says Lokita.

Safe, But Still Searching for Home

At 71, Lokita had just retired from a long and rewarding career as a Steiner teacher when she moved to the Sunshine Coast. She'd always felt called by the trees and landscape on her visits to Queensland, and finally made the move. She initially landed with her daughter and her partner, grateful for the safety but didn't expect to be with them for so long. What was supposed to be a short term solution extended to two years and she knew she wanted to find a place of her own.

Then she came across Better Together Housing in a local newspaper. The idea of women supporting each other through connection and shared housing instantly resonated. She attended a meeting and felt an immediate sense of recognition and respect.

A Defining Moment

Through Better Together, Lokita began to meet women of similar age and circumstance, women she now calls friends. She remembers a special moment: driving with another member Liz to a play, when her friend said she'd realised she would need to share a house.

Lokita responded spontaneously: “That could be me!” From that moment, Lokita and Liz began looking for a home together, inspecting properties, talking through needs, and building trust.

“Of most benefit to me has been meeting women of similar age and circumstances, forming friendships and becoming buddies to attend concerts with, have beach outings with, and casual cuppas - anytime.” Says Lokita



The Impact

- Lokita has moved from uncertainty to hope and a clear plan for the future
- She has formed deep friendships reducing isolation and has a committed future housemate
- Better Together has given her tools, confidence and support to navigate housing challenges
- She feels visible, acknowledged and valued, reducing the isolation many women face

Looking Ahead

Lokita now imagines an easy transition into a sunny home where she and her new friend can garden, share meals, and contribute to their local community.

Gabriella – Rebuilding Confidence and Belonging

“The amount of help and energy that is put into this program, we get back our self-respect. Better Together Housing helps fix the broken pieces.” Says Gabriella.



A Remarkable Life

Gabriella has lived a remarkable life, from her early days in Hungary, to a career in fashion, design, and entrepreneurship that took her across the world. “I’ve had many chapters,” she says, “and I always had what I needed, one way or another.”

But after a lifetime of helping others, Gabriella found herself in an unexpected place. Having given too much of her time, energy, and money to people she cared about, she suddenly realised she had little left for herself. She became unwell, moved in with one of her sons, and despite everyone’s best intentions, it wasn’t working. “It wasn’t anyone’s fault... but I was desperately unhappy.”

Finding Support and a Way Forward

A social worker connected her to Better Together Housing, where she found understanding, community, and hope. Within weeks, Gabriella was re-energised joining a local group for migrant women, finding part-time work, and meeting Monique, who would become her supportive housemate and friend.

The Impact

- Gabriella now has safe, stable housing with a supportive housemate
- Her health, creativity, and confidence have returned
- She’s reconnected to her purpose through work and community
- She’s rediscovered self-worth and joy after years of struggle

Looking Ahead

Gabriella is now focused on writing her next book, exploring new creative projects, and inspiring other women to rediscover their self-worth. “Better Together Housing gave me the strength to believe in myself again, and now I’m living it.”

Fiona – Finding Safety After the Storm

“I was in such deep grief and fear, but BTH helped me find my way out. It changed everything.” Says Fiona

A Productive Caring Life

After 30 years working in health and IT, Fiona’s life took a difficult turn. Ongoing health issues, years spent caring for her mother with dementia, and using her superannuation to cover expenses left her financially and emotionally depleted. When her mother passed away, Fiona was overwhelmed by grief, anxiety, and the looming fear of homelessness.

Finding Support

Desperate for help, she contacted Better Together Housing after being referred by Centrelink and the Department of Housing. Attending her first gathering gave her something she hadn’t felt in a long time – hope. “It was so good meeting others in my situation,” she says. “For the first time, I didn’t feel alone.”

With BTH’s support, Fiona was referred to Coast2Bay Housing – and within weeks, she received a life-changing call. She’d been offered a brand-new, affordable unit. “It was a godsend,” Fiona says. “It’s beautiful, peaceful, and I finally feel safe.”



The Impact

- Fiona now has secure, long-term housing that’s safe and serene
- Her mental health and wellbeing have improved dramatically
- She has regained a sense of peace, safety, and independence
- Her little dog is by her side, completing her new home

Looking Ahead

For Fiona, the change has been transformative. “This home has given me my life back. It’s quiet, secure, and I finally feel safe,” she says. “It’s a miracle to me, a complete turnaround from where I was.”

Monique - Finding Confidence, Community and a Home

"I wish other women knew that Better Together Housing exists and that it exists for them. It is a safe place where you don't need to feel shame. You will be listened to, supported, and guided. I'd rave about BTH to anyone in my position and I'd urge them to make contact as soon as possible." Says Monique.



A Life Spent Caring

At 66, Monique had spent her life caring for others, raising three children, balancing decades of unpaid family work with low-paid roles in customer service and care. Like many women of her generation, she reached later life without the financial security of superannuation.

From Instability to Community

In 2024, after contracting COVID, Monique became too unwell to keep working. She gave up her job, left an unaffordable Brisbane rental, and moved to Maryborough to stay with family. While it gave her a chance to recover her health, she knew it wasn't a long-term solution.

Having heard of Better Together Housing, she joined and attended gatherings in Brisbane, then later a series in Nambour. For the first time, she felt surrounded by women who truly understood. "We all had different stories, but we were in the same boat, trying to find a way out of housing insecurity."

The Impact

- Monique has secured safe, stable housing with another BTH member
- She gained confidence and courage to explore shared living arrangements
- Shame and isolation were replaced with understanding, support, and hope
- She now lives in a peaceful, respectful home with companionship and trust

Looking Ahead

Monique hopes to continue living in secure housing where mutual respect and harmony are the foundation of her home. After years of instability, she is embracing a future of stability, safety, and connection.

Jennifer – Finding Connection and Confidence

“Come to the meetings with an open heart and mind, you’ll find support, friendship, and hope.” Says Jennifer.

Independent and Adventurous

At 62, Jennifer has lived a life full of learning, travel, and change. She worked across libraries and community centres working in many temp roles until 2014. She has also extensively toured South-East Australia by bicycle, embracing independence and adventure.

She has been a member of a movement to improve housing for older women for sometime. She has faced ongoing anxiety and financial stress relating to insecure housing for years she says. “I experienced some conflict in my accommodation arrangements but have learned new ways to solve problems.” She says.

Discovering Community and Support

Joining Better Together Housing in 2020, Jennifer found a welcoming community of women who truly understood her situation. “Going to the Nambour meetings gave me hope,” she says. “I realised I wasn’t alone.”

Today, Jennifer has made strong friendships and developed new confidence through shared learning and mutual support. She feels part of something bigger – a community of women determined to create safe and secure futures together.



The Impact

- Friendship and belonging have replaced isolation
- Wellbeing and confidence have grown through shared experiences
- Hope and practical skills for building a more secure housing future

Looking Ahead

Jennifer is now focused on contributing to her own long-term housing and helping others do the same. “Better Together Housing has shown me what’s possible when women come together,” she says. “We really can build a brighter future.”

Helen - Preparation and Finding Community

“There is nothing more powerful than women healing women. Better Together Housing offers dignity, support, and hope and it reminds us that we are not alone.” Helen



A Life of Leadership and Care

Helen, 69, worked in the corporate world as a banking team leader before shifting her focus to supporting survivors of domestic and family violence and offering retreat catering. With two daughters and three grandchildren, she is semi-retired and enjoying life in Maleny.

Currently, Helen rents a unit on a two-acre property at an affordable rate. But with the elderly owners she is mindful that her living arrangement could change quickly, with a risk of losing her home or a steep rent increase. Knowing how quickly circumstances can change, Helen preemptively joined Better Together Housing for support and connection.

Discovering Better Together Housing

When Helen saw an ad for a Better Together Housing meeting at the Maleny Neighbourhood Centre, her interest was piqued. With her background in women’s health and safety advocacy, she immediately recognised the value of creating spaces where women could connect, share, and support one another.

For Helen, Better Together has been as much about community as housing. She treasures the friendships she’s built, the knowledge she’s gained, and the safe space to share and listen.

The Impact

- Helen has built strong friendships with other women in similar situations
- She’s gained confidence and knows her housing options
- She’s seen women’s lives change through Better Together Housing gatherings
- She now feels hopeful, empowered, and ready for the future

Looking Ahead

Helen hopes for a future where housing is treated not as an investment tool but as a basic right, where women can live with dignity and security. She calls for less talk and more action from governments: funding, grants, and relaxed regulations to make multiple occupancy and shared living easier.

Barbara – Finding a Safe and Secure Housemate

“Firstly, I just wish other women knew about Better Together Housing. You can sum it up in one word, HOPE! Something good will happen here, because the people in this program don’t just talk about helping you, they actually do it.” says Barbara.

A Shift from Stability

Barbara, from Caloundra, spent 17 years sharing a home with a close friend. When her friend moved away to be nearer to family, Barbara suddenly found herself struggling to cover rent alone. She wasn’t homeless, but she knew the financial pressure wasn’t sustainable.

Finding Community

Her real estate agent connected her to Better Together Housing, and Barbara immediately felt she had found the right place. Online searches had only shown her younger housemates in their 20s and 30s, not a good fit. But with BTH, she felt safe, supported, and reassured that women her age, with police checks and shared values, were out there too.

Barbara remembers her first gathering clearly: “The welcome was so warm. I didn’t feel like a stranger. The other women welcomed me straight away.”

Through BTH, Barbara was introduced to Ane-Marie, and they arranged to share a home. With support around boundaries and communication, Barbara adjusted to shared living and found new confidence.



The Impact

- Barbara has found financial relief by sharing rent and easing the cost of living alone
- She’s built friendships and connections in a safe, supportive community of women her age
- She’s gained confidence in shared living, using practical tools and boundaries to make the transition smooth
- She now feels renewed optimism and hope for the future

Looking Ahead

Barbara hopes for stability and the peace of knowing she won’t have to move year after year. With humour, she adds that her ultimate dream would be to “win Lotto!” But for now, the security and companionship she’s found through Better Together Housing are enough.

Sue – Finding Hope and Stability for Mum

“You need to be proactive, be open to this. I would drive someone there myself if I met them in the position we were in. I’d shout it from the rooftops. The shared living arrangement is so powerful. People are dying of loneliness this can be life-changing.” Says Sue.

When Mum Needed Help

At 56, Sue never imagined she would be navigating her mother’s sudden housing crisis. Once independent, with a home and car, Sue’s mum lost everything after a devastating long-term scam drained her finances. When her twin sister passed away, she was left with debt, grief, and no stable place to live.

Finding a Way Forward

Sue and her husband brought her to the Sunshine Coast, but with only a small home, they knew it couldn’t be a long-term solution. Sue tried everything, contacting the Department of Housing, making 26 phone calls to different services, but got nowhere. Finally, a social worker referred them to Better Together Housing.

At first hesitant about sharing, Sue’s mum attended a gathering. The warm welcome and support quickly gave her hope. Soon after, she was introduced to Barbara, a woman also looking for a housemate, and a safe, secure living arrangement was formed.



The Impact

- Sue’s mum is now in safe, stable housing with a kind and welcoming housemate
- Anxiety and stress have lifted – her health and peace of mind restored
- Family relief: Sue, her husband and all her siblings now know their mum is safe, comfortable, and no longer at risk
- Most importantly, the family has rediscovered hope after crisis

Looking Ahead

Sue hopes her mum and Barbara can continue building a strong, long-term living arrangement and perhaps one day secure housing together that removes the fear of future upheaval.

Ane-Marie - From Loss to New Beginnings

“If you go to Better Together Housing, your worries can be split in half. You’ll be listened to, cared for, and guided in the right direction. It really can change your life.” Says Ane-Marie.



Losing Security

At 80, Ane-Marie is a mother, grandmother, and great-grandmother. Originally from Auckland, she lived comfortably and independently for many years in Cairns with her twin sister. But when her sister passed away, life changed dramatically.

A devastating financial scam left her with nothing but clothing, a few possessions and some furniture, forcing her to leave behind her independence, her home, and her security. Moving in with her daughter on the Sunshine Coast gave her shelter, but Ane-Marie felt like a burden and longed for a stable home of her own.

Discovering Better Together

Her daughter discovered Better Together Housing and encouraged her to attend a meeting. At first hesitant, Ane-Marie soon found comfort among women who understood her situation. “At my first meeting, Maggie really listened to me and then she actually did something about it,” she recalls.

She secured housing with another BTH member Barbara which has changed everything for her. “I just want to have a nice life – and I am actually saving a little bit now which feels so good.” Says Ane-Mare.

The Impact

- Ane-Marie has regained safe, secure, and independent housing
- Isolation has been replaced by community, understanding, and care
- She feels supported, guided, and listened to in ways she hadn’t expected
- With stability, she is saving again and enjoying life with renewed optimism

Looking Ahead

As she celebrates her 80th birthday, Ane-Marie looks forward to a future of stability and dignity. She wants to enjoy her life without the fear of housing insecurity and is determined to make the most of the security and support she has found through Better Together Housing.

Step 1 - Register
